Note that the Nelson eBus Routes 1 and 5 travel along Lower Queen Street and stop outside the nearby Oakwood Retirement Village. Use your Bee Card, which if linked to your Super Gold card, will give you free travel in the off-peak. Route 1 is half-hourly to and from Nelson via Waimea Road. You can use Route 2 from Nelson via Tahunanui and change at Stoke or Richmond to Route 1. Route 5 has one service to and from Motueka that is suitable for this event. Unfortunately, Route 6 from Wakefield does not run at a suitable time.

Branch Activities

Our Vice-Chairman, Alec Waugh, is investigating holding some meetings at retirement villages where there is a significant GSA membership. His initial plan is to hold one at Oakwoods in October to establish its viability. We will then progress to other venues next year. Notification of these events will be directed to those members who are residents, so will not be generally broadcast. The GSA head office can send out notices to all branch members but at a cost to the Branch. We will use email where members have this facility but recognise that those without email must not be excluded from notification of events. In addition, the Nelson Branch section of the GSA website will carry notices of events when they have been organised. Members are welcome to offer suggestions for activities or venues to the Secretary for consideration by the Committee.

GSA Council Meeting 2025

The annual meeting of the GSA Council was held in Wellington on 6 & 7 September. The Council is the supreme ruling body of our organisation and comprises the GSA President and two delegates from each Branch. Also present are the GSA Board and Life Members. Alec Waugh and Una McNair represented the Nelson Branch this year.

Annuity News, the national GSA newsletter, will cover the business aspects of the meeting so this note will just report on a few observations.

 There were no unexpected dramas. Nelson's suggested changes to the Policy wording under the heading "5 Background - The Political Landscape" were accepted, and Nelson was to the fore, once more, with a suggestion that the Board looks at the Accumulated Funds (Reserves) of the organization, and whether a component should be placed in managed funds, e.g. Kiwi Saver, to preserve and enhance membership funds. Currently 100% are in term deposits which, when inflation and tax is applied, does not enhance our reserves. The suggestion was for Board consideration and was not formally debated by Council.

- The subscription rate is to be increased by 30 cents per fortnight from 1 April 2026, (\$42.90 per year). The sub increase was part of a hybrid approach to the long-term future of the organization, with increasing debate and focus on the best structure for the future for the GSA, including effective costs savings etc. Detailed statistics were provided to delegates on this topic, with projections, keeping in mind the trend continues of declining membership and less subscription paying members.
- Several Council workshops took place, on branch leadership, retention, and recruitment of members, etc., and several updated pamphlets and brochures were produced.

Our Generation

You are the last generation to live through a time when: Black-and-white TVs were cutting-edge. Highways weren't motorways. Shopping meant visiting downtown stores. Polio was a feared disease. While your parents worked hard to rebuild their lives, you grew up in a world of endless possibilities. You thrived in a time of peace, progress, and security that the world may never see again. If you're over 77 years old, take pride in having lived through these extraordinary times. You are one of the lucky 1% who can say, "I lived through the best of time!".
