Chairman's Update – September 2022

The Council meeting was held in Wellington on the first weekend in September. This was the first actual meeting for two years, due to Covid restrictions. Important items from the previous year, *the 2020 minutes and annual accounts*, needed acceptance before the current meeting could begin.

The President reported that while it had been difficult to operate under Covid restrictions business, continued. New skills were learned, including the conducting of virtual meetings and online Board elections. The financial position was improved for National Office and most Branches because of travel restrictions. However the ongoing problem of an ageing membership persists with some Branches being unable to attract office holders (Chairs, Secretaries, and Treasurers) or reach a quorum for meeting. The quorum for an AGM is 20 members and a committee meeting now requires four. He mentioned that there is a new Incorporated Societies Act and the GSA will need to comply with the changes as they become known. He touched on the personnel changes in the Wellington National Office and introduced the new Executive Officer, Gabe Pang.

The Agenda commenced with the Finance Sub-Committee. The Strategic Plan Reports followed, outlining the progress made in achieving the organization's goals in the areas of Communication, Advocacy, Organization (branch liaison and support, employment, constitution), Support for members, Recruiting and finally Policy objectives.

Board elections were held. Both the President (Tony Hamilton) and Deputy President (Alan Straker) were re-elected unopposed. Five of the 7 candidates who stood for the Board were elected.

Three Life memberships were awarded. The recipients were Dick Kitto (Canterbury), Ian Clunies-Ross (Wellington) and Dallas Elvy (Wellington).

A rule change to increase the number of Board members from five to six was promulgated by the Hawkes Bay Branch. Board members would be elected for a two year term, with three standing down each year by rotation. All would be available for re-election. This would allow a planned roll-over to maintain continuity. The motion was lost due to the increase in cost and unpredictability of life.

Two guest speakers addressed the meeting. The first, Simon Tyler, described the function and performance of the Government Superannuitants Fund Authority, (GSFA). He described their progress on meeting the expectations of Government and outlined their aggressive investment policy. He noted that \$920 million was paid out to annuitants last year. Approximately 70% of this comes from Government coffers, the other 30% comes from their investments. Simon is retiring after 10 years of service. The asset base has risen from \$3 billon to \$5 billion under his tenure.

The second speaker was Greg O'Connor, the Labour MP for Ohariu. He had just been appointed Deputy Speaker of Parliament. He spoke of his experiences as an MP. Greg noted that the existence of the GSA is an important reminder to Government of our significance. His take-home message was for us to "stay organized and continue to do what we are doing!"

The issues discussed at Council, were reported back to Branch members at meetings in Mangonui and Whangarei.

Finally we look forward to catching up with members socially at our Christmas luncheon at the Kamo Club on 24 November.

From the time I started work I was involved in Superannuation and now that I am long retired the benefits are even more obvious.

In the mid 60's I was an Accountant for Cable Price Downer Ltd. I managed their group superannuation scheme. While managing the investment portfolio and seeing, first hand, the benefits accruing to members on their retirement was rewarding.

In 1973,after an extended OE I returned to New Zealand and became a foundation member of the Accident Compensation Commission (ACC). Joining the National Provident Defined Benefit Plan (DBP) was an easy decision to make. DBP members form a minority of GSA membership since they were not core public servants. The decision by the Government to close the Government Superannuation membership resulted in my helping to establish Shamrock Superannuation Ltd, an independent superannuation fund for ACC staff, which still operates today.

On retirement in 2009 Marianne and I attended our first GSA luncheon in the Kamo Club where we were met enthusiastically by Hugh Black and "next minute" I was on the GSA Committee. Committees, of one sort or another, have been a feature of my life since I was 16 and as mentioned by Jack Kerr on his retirement from the GSA Committee, such participation can be very rewarding.

I remained on the local GSA Committee for two terms before a work commitment in Botswana caused me to resign. I returned to the Committee for two years under Roger Barber's chairmanship. I have enjoyed my time on the GSA Committee but more recently I have become closely involved in the restoration and day to day operation of the Whangarei Men's Shed, based at the old railway station. Time constraints mean that I have had to relinquish the GSA Committee role.

I know that the Committee is in very good hands and wish everyone all the best for the future. Having the GSA to keep a watchful eye on the operation of our superannuation scheme brings peace of mind.
