Government Superannuitants Association successfully re-register

If you are involved with any Incorporated Society in New Zealand you may be aware that an enormous amount of work has been underway to update constitutions to meet the new requiriments of the Incorporated Societies Act (2022). Like other Incorporated Societies, the Government Superannuitants Association worked through this process, updating the constitution, and in September 2024 was successfully re-registered. Not only is it worth a read, some members involved in other Incorporated Societies have commented that it is helpful to have an example of one that has been successfully updated. Presentation from Professor Rod Jackson - Christmas Function 2024



Professor Rod Jackson is an epidemiologist with a long career researching cardiovascular health. A success from research led by Rod is PREDICT, a risk prediction tool for GPs to calculate a score for a patient's likelihood of having a heart attack or stroke.

Rod is a firm believer in "we are what we eat" and presented some interesting points on changing diet and lifestyles in New Zealand that have impacted on cardiovascular health. For example, in 1967 New Zealand had the *worst* heart disease statistics in the world mainly due to the consumption of saturated fats, salt and cigarettes.

Although there have been significant improvements in healthy lifestyles and diets over the years there is competing

increase in the consumption of unhealthy processed and refined foods that have contributed to an increase in obesity rates and associated health issues.

In the heart health story Rod noted that saturated fats and salts with a high sodium content remain the villains while fresh fruit, vegetables and wholefood carbohydrates providing fibre and fuel for the gut microbiome are the heroes.

Rod ended his informative, entertaining and lively interactive presentation with a nod to potato, carrot and parsnip, the food superheroes rich in potassium, an excellent

option for regulating blood pressure. On behalf of Professor Jackson, the branch donated \$200 to the Auckland City Mission.



Branch Meeting March 2025 - Professor Shanthi Ameratunga

We were fortunate to have Professor Shanthi Ameratunga speak at our first branch meeting for 2025 about the research she did on how older residents and disabled people found opportunities for active travel in their neighborhoods. It was entitled **Inclusive Streetscapes**.

Shanthi was born in Sri Lanka, grew up in Porirua, qualified in medicine at the University of Otago and trained in paediatrics and public health medicine. She holds honorary professorial positions at the University of Auckland, Monash University (Melbourne) and University College London.

Shanthi and her fellow researchers surveyed 62 people living in Henderson/Ranui, Mangere, Glen Innes and Howick. Most participants did a "go along" journey during where they pointed out the challenges and pleasures of their daily travel – some were in wheelchairs and some on foot with assistance from walkers and sticks. Participants described how they feared walking in areas with few road crossings, dangerous crossings or curbs or having to move from the path and onto busy roads to avoid cracked pavements and overgrown hedges. Steep ramps leading to bridges over motorways were also challenging. For the participants, these factors made their worlds painfully small.

Shanthi also surveyed a group of public and private sector transport professionals to find out how much accessibility, health and community wellbeing featured in transport decision making. It was concluded that while there was a

symbolic commitment to accessible outcomes in the sector, there was a disconnect between this and how solutions were delivered on the ground.

In summary, the research recommended that consultation on transport design should take into account legislation and principles that are already in place to protect the rights of older residents and disabled people in Aotearoa New Zealand. Shanthi concluded that transport professionals need to design, implement and monitor systems that make accessibility a much more important transport objective.



Shanthi took questions and comments from the floor and then invited attendees to continue their observations and discussion with the appropriate people.
